Big Lottery Fund

The fund is the largest of the four and responsible for distributing over £650 million each year (40 per cent) of all the money raised which totals around £8 billion since 2004. Kelly has worked at the Heritage Lottery Fund in the South West since 2002 and has undertaken many roles including assessment of applications and strategic planning for the region. She has worked in HLF's development team since 2005 providing support to applicants and outreach work to expand people's knowledge of heritage and the fund. She has a practical approach when assisting potential applicants. Kelly comes from a background in history and arts but her experience at the fund has given her wide knowledge of the broad range of heritage sectors.

Real Ideas Organisation (RIO)

RIO equips people to take on the world. We do this by working with individuals - developing and running learning programmes linked to real enterprise.

Schools are central to the lives of children and young people and they are changing. We work with schools to support them to take advantage of the opportunities; to overcome challenges and to develop as forward thinking, socially entrepreneurial institutions who work with their young people to develop diverse creative, impactful and innovative capacities, skills and abilities.

We find innovative new uses for disused or empty spaces; renovate redundant buildings; and bring new spaces, facilities and jobs to an area. We work in some of the most disadvantaged parts of the UK, for example, Devonport in Plymouth, where we have renovated a disused Grade 1 listed Guildhall and created a vibrant social enterprise centre, bringing new jobs and opportunities to what was one of the most deprived communities in England. RIO believes that given the right support, opportunities and encouragement, every young - and older - person can realise their potential.

Torbay Community Development Trust

Torbay Community Development Trust(TCDT) was formed in 2013-the new organisation taking over the legacy of Community Voluntary Action Torbay.

TCDT seeks to make Torbay a place where all people feel included and can become involved in developing a more thriving local community.

We aim to do this by:

- Developing and promoting voluntary and community activity in Brixham, Paignton and Torquay – including social enterprises;
- Providing information, training and support for people looking for opportunities to volunteer and for groups who need volunteers;
- Reaching out to all groups and individuals, seeing what support groups and individuals require and what we can all offer each other;
- Encouraging local people to share their skills, time and resources supported by community builders and neighbourhood timebanks and
- Helping groups access funding.

Last year TCDT was awarded a £6 million Big Lottery Fund grant for the Ageing Well programme which will be run and developed over the six years' and aims to reduce social isolation amongst the 50 plus generation in Torbay.

Robin has worked in the voluntary sector In Torbay for over 25 years, formerly Chief Executive of Age UK Torbay, Robin is now Community Funding Adviser at Torbay Community Development Trust where he provides a range of support to voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations in the Bay, including prospective research, bid-writing, organisation health-checks, developing sustainable fundraising strategies, training courses, funding bulletins and Torbay Fundraisers' Forum.
